# Morphology: typological and theoretical approaches 

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Goal: This course provides an overview of morphology from typological and theoretical perspectives. The level is introductory/intermediate with some more advanced materials for the last classes.

Content: The course is organised in the following format: lectures combined with practical sessions (discussion of language data). The material of the course will closely follow the chapters of Fábregas \& Scalise (2012). The textbook contains eight chapters, all of which will be covered, some additional materials will also be included.
